2019 was another year of growth in our capacity to serve more women and children who have been harmed by abuse. We now have four homes and have added resources to fulfill our vision of transforming lives through Christ's love. Together, with the Lord's leading, we walk alongside women and children, helping them to feel known and understood, listening to their stories and believing them. Every day we see the miraculous power of God changing women's lives by restoring hope, affirming value and worth, restoring strength and dignity, and giving them a strong foundation upon which to build their lives.

We give thanks for the Lord's mighty provision through generous supporters and amazing volunteers. In April of 2019, we opened our fourth home, Lydia's Place. With the addition of this home, we increased capacity to serve up to 57 women and children at one time!

Lydia's Place provides:

- An accessibility suite to accommodate physical needs.
- Much needed large group meeting space for women to use for bible study/prayer, training sessions, educational programs, and life skills development.
- The Phyllis Rose Children's Center that provides for the needs of children, all ages.
- Efficient use of space for program staff offices.

Because God led the way, all homes are debt free. Each home provides safe spaces where women and children can experience strength and dignity. The first tangible aspect of providing strength and dignity to women and their children is to provide the safety and stability of a safe place to sleep. A safe place to live. A safe place to "be" as they begin to heal and gain skills to move forward to live free from abuse.

In September of 2019, we launched a new Alumni program to ensure sustained freedom from abuse and to track the long-term outcomes of residents who have transitioned from The Dwelling Place. We are excited to offer a higher level of intentional support through mentorship, monthly case management, monthly support group, and quarterly activities. We are so grateful for all the blessings we received in 2019. We rely upon a wide variety of churches, individuals, foundations, and businesses, so that we can share the message of Christ's love and healing power. We endeavor to fulfill our core-value to honor God through stewardship and to seek His guidance and direction as we continue to serve many women and children in the future.

Vision for the Future

Now more than ever before we understand that our future is in the Sovereign hands our God, our Creator and Sustainer. The COVID–19 pandemic changed our landscape considerably and the need for our ministry and services has never been greater. We established new protocols to ensure the safety of women/families, staff members, and volunteers. We will do all we can to provide rooms and beds and programs to those in desperate need. We know that domestic abuse increases during times of crisis and economic hardship and we continually work to find funding sources to help us maintain full capacity during this time when many other organizations, businesses and ministries have had pull back on their services. We are now looking at creative ways to conduct our fundraising events and connect with partners and other service providers in a way that is safe for all. Please join me in prayers for the Lord's covering of protection from the virus for all of the families and staff under our roofs. We pray for you and those you love, your health and unique circumstances that arise. Together we lean upon the Lord to help us weather this new reality with His grace, strength, and peace.

OUR PROGRAM

The Dwelling Place provides safe transitional housing and trauma-informed Christian programs for women and their children escaping abuse.

Intensive Case Management & Supportive Services

Our trauma-informed care consists of two primary healing principles: safety and empowerment. Women and children recovering from the trauma of domestic violence need to be and feel safe and become empowered to change their own future. We have 22 years of experience in providing safe dwelling space and services to victims of domestic abuse. We combine best practices with a strong Christian environment. We were founded on the understanding that in order to help victims of domestic abuse heal from their emotional wounds our programs must be Christ-centered and comprehensively designed to address the whole person. We work to help residents become empowered through intensive case management with individualized care plans that recognize and build upon their strengths, as well as provide detailed solution-focused strategies to address their areas for growth and future goals.

2019 SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS

In 2019, we successfully housed and served **29 women** and **43 children** (**23** of the women are **mothers**).

- We received calls for help from 414 women with 299 children–all victims of domestic abuse.
- All women left domestic violence successfully and detached from their abusers. The women and children found safety and remained safe within our program.
- 72 women and children received 10,717 nights of safety; with the average stay of 10 months. (Average length of stay of those graduating in 2019 was 13 months).
- All women attended at least 9 hours of classes each week and learned about the dynamics and effects of domestic abuse.
- All women attended at least 2 hours per week of life skills training in budgeting, cooking, nutrition, health and wellness, and other related topics.
- All women and children participated in daily Christian spiritual discipleship and Bible studies with the intent to grow in their faith.
- 87% of mothers improved their parenting skills to break the generational cycle of abuse through parenting consultation, classes and daily parenting guidance from staff.
- 80% of women received advocacy and support for overcoming barriers through transportation, job skills, legal, educational and housing assistance.
- 80% of women established new life goals and skills to better manage emotional health.
- All mothers of school-age children learned to advocate for their children within the schools for improved behavior plans as needed.
- All school-age children were provided with 1.5 hours per week of support group programming to help them process their trauma.
- All school-age children were provided with 1.5 hours of tutoring per week to bridge their learning gap.
- All toddlers participated in 5 hours per week of large motor skills development activities, critical for healing from trauma. School-aged children participated during the summer.


FINANCIALS


Financial Position
